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## Get Ready For Multi-Database!

Judging from all the positive feedback you gave us during our demonstrations at the American Library Association (ALA) Midwinter Meeting in January, we know many of you are planning to install the new NOTIS Multi-Database product. Many institutions have expressed the need for online public access to externally-produced and locally-mounted data bases through a powerful, unified user interface. Multi-Database provides just that.

We have not yet established a pricing schedule for this add-on product. We expect to have Multi-Database available this summer, and we will issue price information as soon as possible. The first release of this product will support access to the MEDLINE data base and the data bases of the H. W. Wilson Company. For price information regarding the Wilson indexes on tape, the person to contact at Wilson is Ms. Aline Locascio, (212) 588-8400, ext. 371.

One of the implementation issues involved with Multi-Database is the required storage space on your mainframe. To assist your planning, NOTIS Systems Development has provided space requirements for the data bases we demonstrated at ALA Midwinter. (See the shaded box above left.) These figures are for one year's worth of source data and all the index files (including keyword and the reverse keyword index).

# NOTIS Customer Support Guidelines For Additional Institutions

In the past year, several NOTIS sites have become host institutions for new consortia, providing other libraries with access to the full array of NOTIS features and functions. Host institutions make their own arrangements with these additional institutions although NOTIS Systems requires payment of a license fee and an annual maintenance charge for each additional institution.

NOTIS Systems generally considers each additional institution as part of the host institution in terms of providing basic support as described in the following guidelines. Eventually, these guidelines will be incorporated into the "NOTIS Basic Support Policy" booklet. We suggest you insert a copy of the guidelines into that booklet for future reference.

If you have any questions about the guidelines or the standard basic support policy, please call your User Services Librarian.

## GUIDELINES

1. The staff of the host institution is responsible for mastering the installation, operation and maintenance of NOTIS software prior to adding an additional institution.
2. In all cases the additional institutions will call the host institution, not NOTIS, for information, assistance and support.
3. Additional support days supplied as part of the additional institution fee may be used at the discretion of the host institution. However, NOTIS recommends that the additional support days not be used for implementation training of the additional institution by NOTIS, but rather that the host institution itself conduct the implementation training for the additional institution. The host should be in control of implementation decisions and the training related to these decisions in order to ensure that they can be supported.

4. Conversion training should be requested for an additional institution only after the additional institution has had implementation training.
5. NOTIS recommends that the host institution ask the additional institutions to follow the NOTIS basic support policy when calling the host institution.
6. Additional institutions may send any number of people to the NOTIS Users' Group Meeting (NUGM).
7. NOTIS does not provide training or support for hardware or telecommunications equipment.
8. Additional institutions may purchase any extra-cost product or service directly from NOTIS, or the host institution may act as the purchasing agent.
9. Each additional institution will receive one set of NOTIS documentation and two copies (per issue) of NOTISes as part of the additional permanent license fee/annual maintenance fee. The host institution is responsible for informing NOTIS whether to send this material to the additional institution or to the host institution. NOTIS will supply forms for this purpose to the host institution.

# Survey On System Modifications

NOTIS Systems Development recently sent a survey to all TECH-1 contacts requesting information about site modifications to the basic NOTIS Library Management System. The goal of this project is to provide our customers with a standard method for modifying the base LMS code. The use of a standard modification methodology will speed up the installation of new LMS releases, and allow easier customization of the code. The first step in this process is to determine where the code has been changed and why. # Correction For Patron Counter

Some NOTIS users have reported problems with bad counters in patron records for RECALLED ITEMS, ITEMS CHRGD, and OVERDUE causing patrons to be blocked when they shouldn't be or not to be blocked when they should be.

The "RECALLED ITEMS" counter is discussed in Problems V135, V167, and V168 of the "Troubleshooting Guide" (see NOTISes 36 and NOTISes 37/38). Therein, we recommend changes which will prevent this counter from being wrong in the future. A method of correcting wrong counters is also presented in Problem V135. (A correction to Problem V135 was included in the February NOTISes.)

The ITEMS CHRGD counter is discussed in Problem V051. Prior to Release 4.3, there were bugs which could cause this counter to be wrong. Since that time we have not heard of problems with the ITEMS CHARGD counter. (We have seen discrepancies between this counter and the patron charge index, but in each case the discrepancy was due to an incorrect patron charge index. See Problems 2802, V074, and V222). If you know of instances where the ITEMS CHRGD counter is incorrect, please send us documentation.

The OVERDUE counter is discussed in Problem 2510. This discussion includes a number of reasons that this counter might be wrong—and a reason you might think it's wrong when compared to the patron charge index. If you know of other causes for the OVERDUE counter being wrong, we would very much appreciate your letting us know.

The LB680 job distributed with Release 4.4 audited the patron and item files and located instances where the ITEMS CHRGD counter was wrong. It did not audit the OVERDUE counter and it did not attempt to correct either counter. The only method for correcting these two counters was the use of the CICS CECI transaction.

We have developed a new version of the LB680 job which generates an audit report for both the "ITEMS CHRGD" and "OVERDUE" counters, and we have created LB682, which updates the counters based on the information produced by LB680. These programs are currently being beta-tested. We expect to make them available as part of a 4.5.1 fix-tape during March or April.

## Special Interest Group News

### Meeting Minutes

On January 10, 1989, approximately 50 people crowded a small room in the Mayflower Hotel during ALA midwinter to discuss training for NOTIS. The first speaker was Kathy Cunningham from NOTIS Systems who updated us on the status of the new training workshops being held in Evanston and in conjunction with American Library Association meetings and NOTIS Users' Group Meeting 1989. The updated list was published in the February issue of *NOTISes*.

Carol Hert, of the University of Delaware, briefly covered the focus of the group, which is to facilitate the exchange of information about in-house training activities. There are currently two subcommittees of the SIG, the documentation clearinghouse subcommittee, and the cooperative projects committee.

There was some discussion of possible programs at ALA and NUGM. Most people were not interested in theoretical programs (e.g. Adult Learning Theory) but suggestions for programs on the various components, and planning the training function were received. Jane Aitkens of McGill University is currently working with interested people to plan programs for ALA and NUGM. The possibility of regional workshops cosponsored by NOTIS and the SIG or individual institutions was mentioned. Maribeth Ward, of NOTIS,

reiterated NOTIS's willingness to try to develop such workshops. The steering committee of the SIG will start discussing logistics for such workshops with Carole Norris of NOTIS Systems.

David Gregory, of the University of Iowa, chair of the Documentation Clearinghouse subcommittee presented a plan of attack and met with interested people. Detailed minutes of his meeting will be included in *NOTISes*. The group plans to establish a typology of NOTIS training tools, solicit bibliographies of inhouse training tools from NOTIS sites ("cataloged" using the typology), and distribute the bibliography. Actual materials will be held at LOEX.

Ramona Steffey of Vanderbilt University, met with people interested in cooperative computer based training projects. Information was exchanged on projects at Brigham Young, the University of Vermont, and Cornell. The subcommittee voted to write the Department of Education from Brigham Young University and the University of Vermont for projects involving keyword/Boolean searching. Vermont's project would provide detailed analysis of transaction logs to facilitate planning BI (bibliographic instruction) programs. BYU's project would develop an interactive video to teach keyword.

## News From Users

### University of Michigan Links OPAC To Wide-Area Network

The October 1988 issue of *Merit Network News* includes an article on how the University of Michigan provided Merit network users—both on campus and across the state—with terminal access to U-M's NOTIS online public catalog. The Merit Computer Network links together several Michigan state universities.

The new system allows up to 400 library users to be simultaneously connected.

The Merit Network and the University of Michigan considered three major commercially-available options for linking the IBM 3270-based NOTIS system with the asynchronous Merit network. After evaluating, and rejecting as inadequate, solutions based on the IBM 7171 protocol converter, extended SNA connections, and the Telex 476 terminal/controller, project staff came up with a hybrid solution using software developed at the University of British Columbia and the University of Alberta and a protocol converter developed at the University of Michigan.

### Wayne State Loads CRL Records

Wayne State University in Detroit recently loaded 120,000 bibliographic records from the Center for Research Libraries (CRL) into the university's NOTIS database. Wayne State is one of the first libraries in the U.S. to load CRL records into its own local system, giving its patrons direct access to the holdings information of a remote facility.

Wayne State, a large urban university, has been a NOTIS user since late 1985. The university also acts as a host for DALNET (Detroit Area Library Network) which provides access to NOTIS for ten other Detroit-area libraries.

The Center has an extensive collection of research materials rarely held in North American libraries. CRL members can borrow materials and determine collection development priorities for the Center. CRL has been promoting its programs by encouraging more widespread access to its holdings through a microfiche catalog and local tape-loads of CRL records.

## Washington University's Dial-Up System

Washington University is one of many NOTIS libraries providing patrons with dial-up access to the online public catalog. The following instructions are for those familiar with Washington University's local area network and/or other dial-up services available at the university. Anyone in the NOTIS community who needs more information should call (314) 889-5376.

Washington University utilizes a standard communication mode—full duplex, even

parity, seven (7) data bits, one (1) stop bit, and 1200 bps. Access is provided through an IBM 7171 protocol converter attached to a dedicated IBM 4361-ML5.

### Dial-Up Instructions

1. Raise the "enter class" prompt, using your standard procedures for dial-up or network access.

2. At the "enter class prompt", enter "luis." The system responds with "CALL IN PROGRESS" and "class start."

3. Tap the RETURN key to raise the "enter terminal type:" message.

4. Enter your terminal type code. (If you are unsure of your terminal type, tap the RETURN key to produce a display of valid terminal codes.)

The system responds by displaying a blank screen.

5. Enter the "clear screen" code (for most users, "ctrl-z") to display the LUIS introductory screen. You are now ready to use LUIS.

6. To disconnect from LUIS, enter "z" from any screen.

The system drops you from LUIS and displays the "enter class" message.

7. For questions on using LUIS, contact the Olin Library Reference Desk at x5410.

8. For problems on gaining access to LUIS, terminal type codes, etc., contact Library System Services at x5447.

## Facts About QLINE

NOTISes recently received a fact-sheet filled with interesting information about Queen's University (Ontario) Library Network. Among the impressive statistics are these:

- 70 Qline terminals capable of displaying accents are available for public use at 26 different library sites
- 31 terminals are used for circulation functions at 18 different sites
- 90 terminals are used for a variety of staff functions such as cataloging and acquisitions
- Currently, more than 3000 on-campus terminals may access Qline
- 20 phone lines are available for dial-up access to Qline from anywhere in the world



"Documentation Alerts" gives you advance notice of additions and corrections to NOTIS documentation.

### PROBLEM:

Pat Riva of McGill, Pat Ramage of the University of South Alabama, and Carolyn Kacena of SMU all report a problem with chapter J1 of User Update #15. Apparently pages J1.21-J1.24 of the update do NOT replace pages J1.21-J1.24 of the manual, but instead replace pages J1.22-J1.25. When they attempted to replace page J1.21 of their manuals, they found that they lost the information on that page.

### CORRECTION:

Some copies of the old chapter J1 are incorrectly paginated (they have a blank page inserted in the text). As a result, text appearing on page J1.21 of the old chapter appears on page J1.20 of the newly revised chapter sent with User Update #15. (This page was not sent with the update.) If you have this problem, simply retain the old page J1.21 and renumber the new pages you recently received. We will correct the problem by re-issuing the entire chapter in the near future.

### PROBLEM:

Prior to release 4.4, you could make fund codes with any combination of numbers, letters, or hyphens (up to nine characters). Customers have reported problems with fund codes beginning with the letter "x." The problem is due to a conversion program (LB987) that converted Release 4.4 order/pay/receipt records to the Release 4.4 version. Part of this conversion placed the letter "x" in front of all fund codes to identify fund records not related to NOFA.

### CORRECTION:

Do not begin any fund codes with the letter "x." Write in a cautionary note to that effect on pages H1A.3 and J1A.3 of the *NOTIS Terminal Operator's Manual*, Volume 1: "Technical Services." You may continue to use the letter "x" in any other position of a fund code.

### PROBLEM:

The most recent version of the "Troubleshooting Guide" (Appendix E of the *NOTIS Installation and Operation Manual*), which was sent to customers as Technical Documentation Update #8, lacks a revised old-to-new-number conversion chart.

### CORRECTION:

We have included the chart in this issue of NOTISes (see following pages). We will also reissue it with the next technical documentation update.
